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## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

### **Berlin Township receives 100 percent of our State Aid, “A” bond rating, Emergency Management up-dates, recipient of Eagle Scout Project**

As Mayor, it gives me a great sense of satisfaction and pride when our town is publicly recognized for outstanding projects, programs and practices. Over the past several months we have had several recognitions I would like to announce.

As many of you are aware, the State introduced the Best Practices Initiative to its 566 municipalities several years ago as part of its reform efforts to make government operate more efficiently, strengthen its accountability, and better manage scarce taxpayers' resources. I am excited to announce, that based on our score, Berlin Township has received 100% of our State Aid for 2013. To accomplish this, the town works very diligently to implement the many new requirements the State has imposed on our town. This team effort among the Governing Body, Department Heads and township employees has made it possible to be one of the few towns to receive 100% of their State Aid for which we are very thankful.

Additionally, as seen in the newspapers, while other towns have had their bond ratings downgraded, Berlin Township's rating was upgraded two years ago and we were just informed that we have continued to keep that rating. We have been given an “A” bond rating from Standard and Poors! This clearly shows our financial management and long-term debt structure is strong and in this time of credit crunches, our short, medium and long term fiscal planning has resulted in savings to our taxpayers.

I am also very excited to announce Berlin Township's new Emergency Management Coordinator, Michael (Bones) Schaffer and Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator, Dominic Pinto. Both are experienced fire fighters and assets to our community. The state law requires every municipality to have a state approved Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and to appoint a Coordinator. They, along with the Emergency Management Committee, made of members of Berlin Township Governing body, Police, Fire, Ambulance and school are responsible to coordinate activities to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters. One of Mike's first tasks was his organization of a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training. The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program educates the students about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. About 10 residents from Berlin Township, along with Mayor and Council successfully completed the course and are certified. Additionally, Mike organized and oversaw a Hurricane Preparedness Day this past summer in conjunction with the Camden County Office of Emergency Management, Berlin Township Police, West Berlin Fire-Rescue and Berlin EMS.

The event was sponsored by and held at the Berlin Township Home Depot and a good day was had by all who attended.

I have saved our best news for last. Berlin Township has been very fortunate to be the recipient of a Boy Scout Eagle Project. The timing and the project was such a great fit for our town. One of the finishing touches for our new Shared Services Municipal Hall was the addition of several landscaped areas on our complex. David Latimer had chosen the landscaping of our Municipal Hall as his Eagle Scout project. The Eagle Scout Service Project, or more simply the Eagle Scout Project, is an opportunity for a Boy Scout, to demonstrate leadership of others while performing a project for the benefit of their community. This is the culmination of David's leadership training, and it required a significant effort on his part. I am so proud of David and the professional job he accomplished for our town!!! He approached Dambly's Nursery which donated all the mulch and supplied the shrubs for cost. David's efforts have enabled the town to save thousands of dollars! Thank you David and the Latimer family for a job well done!!!!

In closing, we realize any success is possible as we work with a respectful and cooperative team of elected officials who enjoy serving one of the best little communities in all of New Jersey. During these tough economic times and very restrictive budgets, it's more important than ever to "think outside the box" to do more with less. November is a month to be grateful for many things, including family and friends, great schools, and the community in which we live. Berlin Township is truly exceptional in all these ways, this is why I'm so proud to not only be Mayor of Berlin Township, but also a resident.

## Township resident Boy Scout landscapes Municipal Building for Eagle Project



Township resident and Troop 251 Life Scout, David Latimer, had a vision to landscape and beautify the area around the Berlin Township Municipal Building and Robert T Clyde Park on Day Avenue. He passes the building everyday on his way to Overbrook HS, where he is in his senior year. He decided it would be a great idea to give back to his community by making this his Eagle Scout service project. He had been thinking about it for over a year, but in June he finally began to bring his vision to life. He contacted and met with Mayor Phyllis Magazzu and Public Works Director Chuck Riebel to discuss the feasibility and potential scope of the project. With ideas and artist renditions in hand, he began the planning process for the project proposal. He determined what type and how many shrubs would be needed, as well as where

they would be planted. He also calculated the amount of mulch he would need, both for the plantings at the Municipal Building and the landscaped entrance of Clyde Park, which he planned to renovate. The proposal planning included project costs and manpower requirements, as well as possible sources of donations. His project received final approvals from the Mayor, his Troop leadership and the BSA local council in July, allowing him to really get the project underway.

Four weeks of intensive planning followed. Donations of mulch and shrubs were secured from Dambly's Garden Center, which saved the Township over 5,000 on its projected cost for landscaping materials. In addition, two local pizzerias, King of Pizza and Roma's Pizza, made generous donations to feed the volunteers on the work days. Volunteers were recruited from his Boy Scout troop as well as friends and family, and the work days were scheduled for early September. With the delivery of 20 cubic yards of mulch and over 85 shrubs from Dambly's, the project got underway on Saturday, September 7. Over the next two days, 27 youth and adult volunteers contributed over 220 man-hours of work to complete the project, restoring and beautifying both the park entrance and the municipal building. As Mayor Magazzu commented, "It really makes the building feel complete."

The Mayor, Council and residents of Berlin Township would like to recognize and appreciate the hard work that David and his volunteers contributed to help improve our Township. The landscaping has been long awaited, and truly provides the finishing touch for our Township's Municipal Building.

# PUBLIC SAFETY UPDATES

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

**School/Children Safety-** The Berlin Twp. Police Department would like to send a reminder to the motoring public to help ensure the safety of our children. School is back in session and the pedestrian traffic around the areas of the schools is heavy once again. Be on the lookout for the crossing guards, teachers, and pedestrians in the cross walk walking to and from school. Our children are our most prized possessions so please contribute to their safety.

**Speeding-** There has been several complaints about the motoring public speeding on the residential roadways. The police department has conducted surveys and continues to enforce the speed limit on a daily basis. The enforcement and surveys have found a lot of the operator's of the motor vehicles speeding are often residents within the neighborhood. Some of the most commonly complained about streets are Fairview Avenue, Grove Avenue, Minck Avenue, Lester Avenue, and Franklin Avenue. The speed limit for all of the above streets listed is 25 MPH. Please watch your speed.

**Halloween Safety-** During Halloween, parents and children flood our streets as pedestrians to enjoy the spirit of Trick-or-Treating. Please remember to walk in groups, wear bright colors if possible, and please look both ways before crossing the street. Our vision is often limited due to masks worn, so please take an extra second and be sure of your surroundings before stepping into the street.

**Suspicious Persons-** the police department's greatest asset is the people within it's own community. If you see any suspicious people or vehicles, call 911. Do not approach the person or vehicle yourself. Let the police respond and investigate as to why they are in your neighborhood. Your call often assists the police department solving crimes and keeping the community safe.

**Motor Vehicle Burglaries-** Parked motor vehicles are often targeted by thieves. As a reminder, please lock the doors to your vehicles and keep any valuables or electronics out of site as they often present a crime of opportunity for thieves. If you find that you are a victim of a vehicle burglary, please phone police before you go into your vehicle. This will help police secure potential evidence and help increase the chance of catching the thief.

**"INCASE" system-** "INCASE" stands for In Case of an Emergency. New technology utilizes a bar code sticker that is affixed to a residence or business and allows responding Officers to obtain secured information through the use of their smart phone. This information is obtained in emergency cases only. There is a onetime fee of only \$6.00. If you would like to participate in the service just fill out a small card at the Berlin Twp. Clerk's Office and you will be added immediately. You can also visit ([theincase.com](http://theincase.com)) for more information.

**New Hire-** Lastly, the Berlin Twp. Police would like to congratulate Shawn Park on his recent appointment to the department. ## New Township Banners!

If have not already noticed new banners have been erected along Haddon and Walker Avenues. We have new Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer, and 4th of July banners that will be rotated with the change of the seasons. All of this has been made possible by your local businesses sponsorships.



Please place leave behind the curb/ edge of pavement, in loose piles, directly behind the curb/edge of pavement, **NOT IN THE STREET**, prior to the anticipated collection period for your area. Please keep branches and other foriegn materials out of the leaf piles. Please do not park your vehicles in front of the leaf piles during the collection period. We anticipate several rounds, throughout the Township, typically (weather permitting) up until mid December.

## Take "Notes"!

### Electronics Recycling

The Township, currently collects computers, laptops, keyboards, mice, monitors, printers, modems, laxes, scanners, VCRs, DVD players, tape players, Tvs, radios, stereo equipment, typewriters, answering machines and telephones. These items are, then, taken to the Tab Group, a local company where the items are recycled. At this time, the TAB Group is not charging the Township for those items, which are delivered by the Public Works Department. It is improtant that the items remain in tact. Monitors, with broken screens cannot be collected and recycled. To reduce theft and damages of these items, which have been placed at the curbside, by scavangers, we are considering a community drop off are or event, in the future

### Sanitary Sewer

Please locate the cleanouts for your sewer lateral and replace all broken caps.

Please do not pour grease down the drains or toilets. Please discard cooled grease and food scraps into the trash container for recycling.

### Receptacles/Containers

Please keep in mind that trash receptacles/containers cannot exceed 40 gallons and must have durable handles and covered with a lid. The weight of the containers and contents cannot exceed 50 pounds.

Please use the Township issued 20 gallon recycling container for your recyclables. if you need a recycling container please call 856-767-1854, extension 227 or leave a message. We will deliver the recycling container to your residence.

### Concrete Collection

Every other Friday, broken concrete is collected. The broken concrete pieces must be placed in containers with secure handles and not exceeding 50 pounds. We request that you limit the number of containers, at one collection. To a reasonable amount to make the collection process more efficient please contact the Township hotline at 856-767-1854, extension 246 and leave a message with your address, at the begining of the week of collection, so we can ensure that the concrete is collected by the Public Works Department.

### SNOW

Please park your vehicle off the street, when any snowfall or ice storm is forcasted, to allow for the PWD to perform the necessary removal and/ or treatment. Attempt to wait until the roadway is cleared before clearing your driveway to avoid being plowed back into your cleared driveway.

Please do not place snow, which has been removed from your driveway and sidewalk, into the street.

Residents are required to remove snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter, along the street frontage of the property, within 12 hours of daylight, after the cessation of the snowfall.

**All donations will be distributed to the Township Schools and Churches!**


While we enjoy the many events, concerts, and programs of the season, let’s not forget that there are many less fortunate families
