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## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

For this issue of the newsletter I thought I would provide you with some interesting information you may not know about our community.

### Did You Know...

- There are 3269 registered voters in Berlin Township in 2010.
- The Mayor and Council adopt approximately 15 ordinances per year.
- Bail can be posted in any Court/Violation Bureau in New Jersey. Once processed it is forwarded to the originating Court.
- There are approximately 1730 residential units in the Township
- The winter storms of 2011 costs the Township \$19,800.00.
- The Berlin Inter Community Ambulance responds to approx. 2038 calls per year.
- Anyone who places graffiti on public or private property in the Township, you can be held responsible legally for its removal and a fine of up to \$2000.00 and possible jail time.
- Of the Township's 2010 \$16,985,497.00 tax levy, only 29% represents the municipal share. The balance goes to Berlin Township School (47%) and Camden County (23%) and Fire District (1%).
- The Town's tax collection rate has averaged over 99.62% for the past 10 years.
- The Township has an A bond rating. From Standard to Poor.
- Residential properties make up 50% of the Township's taxable assessments & Commercial & industrial make up 43%, & 7% is comprised of vacant land, farm land, utilities, & apartment assessment for 2011.
- Tauton Run has 108, 55 and over apartment units. Montabello senior housing development has approvals for 348. 55 and over single family homes.
- Berlin Township has lost \$840,511.00 in state aid over the past 4 years.
- Berlin Township has received over 2.4 million in state and federal grant funds to fix roads and recreational purposes over the past 10 years.
- The Township owns over 37 acres of parks and open space.
- The Township disposes of approximately 2,500 tons of trash per year and recycles; glass, alluminum, plastic containers about 600 tons. Other recylables 2200 tons, and 2300 tons of leaves
- There is 31.5 local milage of roads, 7.4 mi of County and 3.1 mi of State roads.
- Trash disposal costs for the current year approximates \$566,000. Fees collected from dog & cat licenses totalled approximately \$14,000, while costs totalled approximately \$20,000 for the prior year.

Although you will not be tested on these facts, I hope that reading them has been informative and fun.

# POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATES



The Police Department ended the year 2010, answering over 43,000 calls for service, seeing an increase in accidents and large scale investigations.

The Police department, in conjunction with the Mayor and Council, are actively pursuing the installation of redlight cameras at a few intersections in Town. With the ever increasing call volume, these cameras will assist in traffic enforcement, as well as bringing attention to all motorists, the absolute need to recognize and obey all traffic laws. These cameras have been proven to reduce accidents, as motorists

become more aware and obedient of the red light law. Everyone will be notified in advance of the cameras being installed and operational.

The Police Department also recognizes Ptl. Fitzsibbon, who was on patrol, and recognized a vehicle which had been used in the commission of a burglary and theft. Ptl. Fitzgibbon stopped the vehicle , and arrested both occupants. He recovered numerous pieces of stolen property and this stop led to the clearing of crimes in Berlin Twp. and Voorhees.

The Chief would like to recognize Sgt. Siderio and his K9 Neco for the years of service to this Town and many surrounding Towns. K9 Neco passed away on Monday, May 23, 2011, after serving the Town from 1999 until 2005.

The Police Department would like to recognize, Detective Sergeant McVeigh for an outstanding job, while investigating a theft from the WalMart store. Suspects entered the store, removed a large amount of merchandise and fled. After a foot chase failed to apprehend the suspect, Det.Sgt. McVeigh, recovered merchandise and processed it using a fuming technique, exposing several fingerprints. After the Sergeant put them into a data base, a positive "hit" came up and a suspect was identified and eventually taken into custody.

## ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

The Electronic Waste Management Act, effective January 1, 2011, requires the recycling of televisions, desktop computers, computer monitors and laptops. These items cannot be disposed of in the normal waste stream. The law requires the manufacturers, which sell these items, in New Jersey, to fund the recycling efforts.

Residents have the option of placing these items out, at the curbside, the same day as the normal trash day, separate from the regular trash and recyclable materials. A special curbside pickup will be performed by the Public Works Department. Residents are encouraged to drop off these electronic waste items, at the Goodwill, Salvation Army and Best Buy stores as they provide proper disposal.

The Electronic Waste Management Act does not cover cell phones, DVD players, VCR's, video game consoles, or other electronic devices, although some retailers and service organizations provide opportunities for recycling these items.

The following electronics will be accepted by the County, answering machines, cable/wires, computers, DVD players, fax machines, keyboards, laptops, modems, monitors, mice, radios, scanners/printers, stereo equipment, tape players, telephones, televisions, typewriters and VCR's.

## TRASH RECEPTACLES

Mayor and Council is in the process of adopting Ordinance No. 2011-2, which will permit a maximum size of 40 gallons, rather than the current restriction of a maximum 20 gallons. The maximum permitted weight of the receptacle and the contents remains at 50 pounds.

The trash receptacle must be in good condition with durable handles, manufactured with the receptacle. A lid must be placed on the receptacle.

When purchasing new trash receptacles, please make sure that the receptacle does not exceed the 40 gallon capacity.

## *It's all on our wall – Berlin Township Municipal Hall, A Shared Services Center*

As the old saying goes – “when times get tough – the tough get going” and that’s exactly what we’re doing in the great little community of the Township of Berlin, New Jersey. If anyone has a doubt they can simply check out our newly renovated municipal hall located about a quarter mile south of the old Berlin Circle to see first hand we mean business when it comes to sharing services. What was once a vacant furniture store and a sign of the times, is now a beautiful new facility set up to serve as a model for the new way of life for all of the 567 municipalities in New Jersey. So here’s our story along with our mission, focus and drive for the future.

On November 7, 2006 our Municipal Building sustained severe structural damage that forced the closure of the building permanently. As a result, the municipal offices were located in a series of temporary trailers, the senior building and a neighboring “yellow” house to the old building. These offices were spread around the town at three locations. The Clerk’s, Tax, Construction, Zoning, Finance and Mayor’s Offices were located in the yellow house and two trailers placed on site, the Police and Court

were located in the senior citizens building and two more trailers while Public Works remained at their site on the opposite end of town. As of April 12, 2010 the Township began moving into our new centrally located new building and combining all township offices under one roof (excluding Public Works) in what is now the new Berlin Township Municipal Hall, A Shared Services Center located at 135 Route 73 South, West Berlin, NJ 08091 (Township of Berlin).

As mentioned previously, this was a building conversion / renovation project as the building was formerly owned and occupied by Gordon’s Furniture. As an existing structure of 30,800 SF, the building is a 1-story fully accessible building sitting on a 3.46 acre property purchased by Berlin Township in the Spring of 2009 for \$2.2 million dollars, well under the listed price. Prior to the purchase, the building sat vacant for 3 ½ years and was becoming an eyesore and an attractive nuisance in the community. The site is located directly on State Highway 73 providing excellent vehicular and public safety access. It’s centrally located in Berlin Township and adjoins an existing township park making

any future expansion easy to achieve. Berlin Township publicly engaged Garrison Architects of Marlton, in a competitive procurement of professional services, to provide architectural design and related services. Services also included an exhaustive study of multiple sites, a shared relationship with the school district, and adaptive reuse of existing buildings. A public construction / renovation bid was awarded to MJJ Construction Company of Atco (Waterford Twp) NJ. Their bid of \$4,546,600 was the lowest responsible bid of 11 bids received on July 2, 2009 and was subject to a Project Labor Agreement. The front building façade (partially made with an economic “thin brick” product) and the grounds have been enhanced to provide a clean, modern, professional and welcoming exterior / front door to our new facility. Additional windows and a sky light in the lobby were added to enable more natural light to enter the building enhancing the interior environment and reducing lighting costs when possible. New sustainable design concepts and energy efficient systems (including motion sensors on most light fixtures) have been installed providing a fully compliant facility designed to save energy costs and consume fewer tax dollars. Other LEED features include low consumption water closets and faucets, use of recycled products and careful waste management, and building envelope improvements such as roofing, windows, doors and wall cavity. MJJ Construction achieved Substantial Completion and released the building to the township on March 31, 2010. The new Municipal Hall / Shared Services Center was FINISHED ON TIME and UNDER THE BUDGET!! Public Safety / Emergency Management / Police Department operations are now State of the Art enabling our town to meet / exceed all required safety / security protocols (i.e. New Sally Port, Prisoner Holding Cells and an Armory). Community benefits include consolidation of all township under one roof including Police Headquarters, Emergency Management Operation Center with alternate fuel source emergency generator, Court Administration, Land Use / Construction / Planning and Zoning Offices, Township Clerk,

Mayor’s Office, Tax Collector’s Office with Drive-up window, Tax Assessor’s Office, Chief Financial Officer as well as a new 180 seat Court / Public Meeting Room. The interior building materials consist of less costly building products finished to look more expensive (i.e. door throughout the building are made of Lauan with a mahogany veneer, wood / wood trim in Court / Meeting Room is white pine wood stained to look like mahogany, the wall behind dais is made with a “thin brick” product, office furniture is metal with wood veneer tops, etc). Our Project Team did an excellent job selecting colors and finishes that look top notch but are actually very common products well within our budget and that can be maintained by our township employees.

Since the opening of our new building, all offices have been moved in and the four temporary trailers have been decommissioned providing immediate relief to the township budget as the rental payments and utility bill payments are no longer necessary. All existing telephone lines have been consolidated / transferred into one new telephone system in the new building making it less costly and more efficient. A new tele/data system can more easily be covered by one maintenance agreement. Our Senior Citizen building was given a once over with a thorough cleaning, a fresh coat of paint inside and the floors have been polished enabling our seniors to have their facility back in tip top shape. We have continued to work on a marketing plan for the yellow house and adjacent township owned property to possibly lease it until the property is sold. Our hope is to sell the building and property as a package to a developer interested in creating a small cluster of residential homes. The proceeds of the lease and eventual sale of this property will provide relief to our township budget and assist with paying down the bond. Our marketing plan may include other township owned buildings / property which may be deemed no longer serving the residents of the township.

Our new Shared Services Center reflects our strong desire to not only consolidate our

township functions and facilities under one roof but also make it known that we have been and will continue to seek new, creative and out of the box ideas and partnerships with other towns to achieve our goal of delivering local services at an affordable cost for our residents. Our new building is ideally suited to make this goal a reality as we have extra space available to accommodate any number of worthwhile shared service agreements. To this end, we have been actively discussing our desire to share services with most of the communities surrounding our town (i.e. Municipal Court, Construction Code / Inspections, Administrative (back end) Services like payroll, purchasing, etc.). Beyond the steps we've taken with respect to our physical plant with our new building, we've also made some strides in reorganizing our Department of Public Works as we recently appointed our long time Consulting Engineer to serve in a joint role as Director of Public Works / Township Engineer and hope to develop this new endeavor into one that brings new meaning to "thinking outside the box.."

In yet another creative move, the Governing Body of the Township of Berlin took action at our March meeting to appoint our long time Township Consulting Engineer, Charles J. "Chuck" Riebel, Jr., to the combined position of Director of Public Works (DPW) / Township Engineer. We did this for a couple of reasons but mostly to save our residents thousands of dollars. Once we learned that our long time Director of Public Works Mike McGee would be retiring and our Township Consulting Engineer was looking to sell his private engineering company, we approached Mike and Chuck to see if the idea of creating a combined position was too far outside of the box and also if Chuck would be interested in the job. At that point, the creative juices began flowing and it's been a very positive and productive experience to date. In addition to saving a lot of money for our residents through this appointment, we will also continue to explore new and creative ideas in the area of engineering all while maintaining the same level of services our residents have

come to expect from our DPW.

We've set the following goals & objectives for our new Director of Public Works / Township Engineer and remain committed to doing what it takes to deliver services during these very uncertain economic times:

- Oversight of the Berlin Township DPW to maintain a top notch level of services to our residents
- Oversight of the Berlin Township Engineering Department to address engineering needs
- Continue to serve as Berlin Township Planning / Zoning Board Engineer to save money that was being paid as a retainer for outside engineer to attend meetings
- Continue to review Berlin Township Planning / Zoning Board applications with escrow funds being used to offset salary and other expenses as engineering will now be done in-house
- Explore the possibility of a Shared Service Agreement with other towns or local public entities to provide them with engineering services for a fee which will be used to offset any salary and other expenses expended to complete their project

In closing, we realize any success is possible as we work with a respectful and cooperative team of elected officials who enjoy serving one of the best little communities in all of New Jersey. During these tough economic times with deep cuts in aid from the state and very restrictive budget rules, it's more important than ever to "think outside the box" to do more with less through shared services. Our new Shared Services Center embodies our commitment and promises to produce results the benefit of our citizens for many years to come.

# EMS UPDATES

2010 Continued to keep our Department busy again, as we were dispatched to a total of 2038 emergency calls. There were 907 in Berlin Borough 773 in Berlin Township and an additional 358 calls for mutual assistance to the surrounding communities.

We want to thank all of our residents and local businesses that continued to support our annual fun drive, your donations are used to cover items such as training, uniforms and equipment. Over the past year in addition to our full time, part time and per diem members we were able to maintain an active roster of nine Volunteer EMT's and three Junior members.

Over the course of the year we participated in many community activities including the Fire Prevention nights of West Berlin and Berlin Fire Companies, Home Depot and K Mart Safety days, the annual July 4th parade, outreach programs with the students of the JF Kennedy School, CPR classes for local businesses and residents, Berlin Rotary's Christmas parade and proudly assisted the Zone 4 Police Tactical Team on standbys when requested. We continued our "Helmets for Safety" program in conjunction with the Berlin Township and Berlin Borough Police departments rewarding our children who were observed using safety helmets while biking, skating and roller blading with soft pretzels compliments of our good friends at "Philly Soft Pretzel Factory" on Route 73.


